
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PARISH MISSION STATEMENT

OLD SAINT MARY'S, built in 1854 as California's first Cathedral,

was the first Cathedral to be named in honor of the dogma of the Immaculate Conception. The Paulist Fathers were given Pastoral responsibilities of Old St. Mary's in 1894 and have faithfully ministered to the people of Chinatown, Nob Hill and the Financial District ever since. A Survivor of the 1906 earthquake and fire, this major historical landmark has been retrofitted to meet new seismic codes; however, we must now comply with the American Disability Act and refurbish the interior of this beautiful old cathedral. THE CONVERSIONS OF ANANIAS AND PAUL A REFLECTION BY PAULIST FR. JOE SCOTT

On Wednesday, January 25, we celebrated the Feast of the Conversion of St. Paul. This year the Chinese New Year is rightly directing our attention. But even as February dawns it's good to remember that the Conversion of St. Paul is a major feast day for the Paulist Fathers! And as Lent is about to begin, Paul and his one-time adversary Ananias offer us a wonderful story of conversion! The tale of St. Paul's conversion is one of the most dramatic events portrayed in the New Testament, even if he didn't actually fall from a horse.

We sometimes forget that Paul's conversion would not have been completed were it not for the quieter but perhaps just as profound conversion of a Christian named Ananias. We don't celebrate the feast of St. Ananias, although we should.

Ananias lived in Damascus, and he undoubtedly had heard the rumor that the fierce anti-Christian Paul was coming to his city to stir up trouble and persecute the Christians living their lives of faith. "Persecution" meant torture and death. "Christians" meant Ananias and the friends he loved.

The same day the Lord speaks to Saul the Lord also speaks to Ananias. The Lord informs him that "Saul of Tarsus has become blind and needs you to lay hands on him to regain his sight."

Ananias thinks to himself, "what is Saul going to do to ME once his blindness is cured? What will stop him from killing me and my neighbor Christians?"

When Jonah faced a similar request to preach to his hated enemies in Ninevah, he took the first boat going in the opposite direction. It took God a ferocious storm and a big fish to get Jonah's attention. Even so, this reluctant prophet never truly became a fervent respondent to God's call.

Ananias doesn't try to avoid God's call by escaping in the opposite direction, but he does protest mightily, arguing all the way that a visit to Saul would not be a good idea. But in the end the Lord says "go!" and Ananias goes. And when he lays his hands on the enemy who could kill him, he calls him "Saul, my brother."

When I hear this story, I often wonder: which of the two underwent the greater conversion? Which is harder, to change your life around from bad to good, or to forgive your very worst enemy, call him "my brother" and mean it?

Both are almost impossible. But with God, all things are possible.

Two things are certain: none of us would be Christians today were it not for St. Paul. And Saul might still be waiting in his blindness of hate were it not for the courage and trust of Ananias.
